The Indian Ceramics Triennale, initiated by the Contemporary Clay Foundation, aims to showcase and nurture the growing diversity of ceramic art expression in India and to exhibit together with the best practices in international contemporary ceramics. The Indian Ceramics Triennale is associated with forward thought and cutting edge art, broadening the scope and viewership of the ceramic medium within the visual arts field.

The Contemporary Clay Foundation is an artist driven, not for profit organization set up to support and elevate clay-based art practices as well as build informed audiences for national and international ceramic art in the country. The Indian Ceramics Triennale exemplifies the vision of the Foundation in pursuing creative excellence.

OBJECTIVES

- To create an open, inclusive platform that showcases experimental clay-based projects, gathered together on the basis of a country wide Open Call;
- To encourage artists to create outside their usual practice, to experiment and go boldly in new directions, to break new ground;
- To engage in a more sustained way with the International ceramics community, creating cross-cultural dialogue with partners from different parts of the world and foregrounding the best practices in the field. The Triennale also will provide opportunities for international artists to engage with Indian culture in a more research-based way;
- To bring critical international focus on Indian ceramic art;
- To engage with the public imagination and encourage wider discourse on clay art and clay in art through exhibitions, symposia, workshops, film screenings, live performances and artist talks.






BREAKING GROUND

EXHIBITION

The disconnect between the escalating pace of technological change and a slower human pace of absorbing change is driving a renewed focus on the medium of clay. Informed by the needs and opportunities of our time, contemporary artists are increasingly choosing clay as muse and medium, plumbing its limitless possibilities and pushing beyond traditional conceptual boundaries.

The first edition of the Indian Ceramics Triennale – Breaking Ground 2018 – opened at the iconic Jawahar Kala Kendra in Jaipur, India on 31 August 2018 and was on view until 18 November 2018. This edition of the Triennale was presented by the Contemporary Clay Foundation and the Jawahar Kala Kendra. At the core of the first edition were 47 artist projects, by artists from India and abroad, which showcased alternative, experimental and experiential uses of ceramics, within and beyond the boundaries of the traditional art gallery. The exhibition explored scale, site specificity and concept through installation, interaction, technology and performance.

ACCESS FOR ALL

Siddhant Shah from Access for ALL conducted two inclusive art walks and workshops at the Indian Ceramics Triennale for visually impaired people in Jaipur. A specially designed Tactile Art Walk was conducted to engage 23 visually impaired participants from the Jaipur Blind School and the Umang Special School to learn more about ceramics and it's application. 25 Braille books and 10 tactile braille artworks were created for the Kripal Singh Shekhawat exhibition to make his work accessible for all.

MASTERCLASSES

Hands-on practical workshops for professionals were conducted by specialists in the field. These were open to the public and encouraged discussion on material and technique against the backdrop of the exhibition. The workshops were facilitated by Ange Peter, Jane Perryman, Kate Malone and the Balls Pond Studio.

CRITICAL WRITING WORKSHOP

The ICT hosted a critical writing workshop facilitated by Skye Arundhati Thomas and R Sivakumar in collaboration with TAKE on Art magazine as part of the TAKE on Writing Series conceptualised by Bhavna Kakar, an outreach initiative to foster the practice of critical art writing in India. Priya Pall was invited as a respondent. This workshop was supported by the Raza Foundation.

INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

The internship program is another vital component of our education program. Students and emerging artists had opportunities to engage with an incredible line-up of artists. They were given an insight into what it takes to put together an event of this scale. We hope that they will take those connections, learning and networks forward and will be inspired to continue working in the arts.

In future editions we would like to expand this program further involving more artists and students in the making of the event.



CURATED WALKS

Through the duration of the event several walks were conducted for various groups of lay and specialist audiences by the curators of Breaking Ground. In the tours the curators discussed the curatorial process and the various themes running through the exhibition, as well as the artistic process and the development of the work in the show.




CATALOGUE

A 136 page hard bound, coloured catalogue, 'Breaking Ground', was published for dissemination by the Contemporary Clay Foundation and released at the closing ceremony of the Triennale by Ray Meeker and Pooja Sood.









BOOK LAUNCH

'Building with Fire' by Ray Meeker, published by CEPT University Press, was released at an event at Breaking Ground, by eminent ceramics collector Dr Raj Kubba. Architect Anupuma Kundoo spoke at the event.

This was followed by screening of the Agni Jata, a film which documents the construction and firing of one of Ray Meeker's first projects in Auroville, India



An eclectic selection of films by well known filmmakers and ceramic artists, was shown on the opening weekend and subsequently during the course of the Triennale. Films by Keith Brymer Jones (UK), Rajula Shah (India) and Tan Hongyu (China) were featured.



COLLATERAL EXHIBITION

KRIPAL SINGH SHEKHAWAT: ARTIST, MURALIST AND REVIVALIST

Presented in collaboration with the Delhi Art Gallery and curated by Kristine Michael, this exhibition shed important light on the work, trajectory and legacy of Kripal Singh Shekhawat who is widely recognised as a blue pottery revivalist, even though he trained as a painter. This exhibition has since travelled to the Museum of Legacies, Jaipur.

The catalogue, 'The Art of Kripal Singh Shekhawat' written by Kristine Michael and published by DAG was released by Mr Brij Bhasin at the opening of the first Indian Ceramics Triennale.

In future editions we will continue to highlight pivotal and historical figures and practices local to the hosting city to build on and strengthen local connections.





CROSS CULTURAL EXCHANGE:

ARTISTS RESIDENCY MODEL + INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

For the 2018 edition, we adopted an artist Residency Model for foreign artists making large scale/ site specific work. This enabled artists to engage with the site and understand the context of the Triennale, and make new work using local materials. ICT established partnerships with residency programs and studios across the country to facilitate the making of the work.

It was an opportunity for young artists and learners to apprentice with professional international artists. In the following years we hope we will have artists in residence across the country in the lead-up to the Triennale.

ART ICHOL IN MAIHAR, MADHYA PRADESH

Art Ichol, is a space where resident artists, craft enthusiasts and talented artisans can collaborate and realise their art projects. Satoru Hoshino (Japan) worked here on his Triennale project in January 2018. His travel and residency was partly supported by the Japan Foundation. Chloe Monks, a student from the Royal College of Art, London was an intern to Satoru Hoshino at Art Ichol.

INDIAN INSTITUTE OF CRAFT AND DESIGN

In August, 2018 the Ceramic Department at IICD hosted Barney Hare Duke, Jo Ayre (United Kingdom) and Warli Artists Ramesh and Rasika Hengadi (India) to enable them to realise the British Ceramics

Biennial project at Breaking Ground. Students from IICD interned with them. This project was partly supported by the British Council and is part of the Indian Ceramic Triennale and British Ceramics Biennial exchange.

ON-SITE AT THE JAWAHAR KALA KENDRA, JAIPUR

Danijela Pivašević-Tenner (Germany), Jacques Kaufmann (Switzerland), and Juree Kim (Korea) worked for two to four weeks each at the Jawahar Kala Kendra in Jaipur, creating work on site for Breaking Ground.

The triennale pulled together an ambitious collection of works, showing a huge range in approach to process and material. Being part of the final push towards a significant exhibition has infectious energy, and it was astonishing to see works of such a great scale appear overnight. We were left with no doubt that the inaugural Triennale has paved the way for an exciting future for contemporary ceramics in India and internationally

Jawahar Kala Kendra (popularly known as JKK), is a not for profit arts and culture center in Jaipur, which endeavours to preserve and promote Indian art on an international level. The Centre embodies both the visual and cultural heritage of Jaipur and has been instrumental in bringing to Jaipur high-quality art exhibitions, performing arts and literary programs. 

BEYOND BREAKING GROUND

BRITISH CERAMICS BIENNIAL AND INDIAN CERAMICS TRIENNALE PARTNERSHIP 2018-2021

With shared objectives, the <u>British Ceramics Biennial</u> and the Indian Ceramics Triennale are key platforms for representing contemporary ceramics practice and acting as catalysts for the international rise of ceramics. We aim to build an artists-led dialogue between India and the UK, exploring the relationship between notions of located ceramic traditions and migratory contemporary clay practice.

We have initiated an exchange programme with the partial support of the Charles Wallace India Trust and the British Council which follows the convention of the international artists' residency model, with both ICT and BCB hosting artists from UK and India for a period of 6 weeks prior to their respective triennial and biennial festivals; with a UK artist in India August/September 2018 and 2021, and an Indian artist invited to the UK August/September/October 2019 and 2021.

The artists would be hosted by BCB and ICT and located within an appropriate studio facility or workspace, alongside other artists, makers, associated creative producers, curators and academics. The objective for the resident artist would be to create a body of work for exhibition/ installation/ dissemination at the BCB or ICT festival.

As part of the ICT 2018, BCB presented 'Made Out of Place' an installation of work emanating from Heart: Beat project created by Joanne Ayre, Ramesh Hengadi and Rasika Hengadi following a short residency period at the Indian Institute of Craft and Design and the JKK exhibition venue.

Shirley Bhatnagar has been selected to represent India at the British Ceramics Biennial in 2019 via an open call for proposals. The Charles Wallace India Trust will support her residency in the UK with an International airfare, living expenses and a materials and production grant.

ARTAXIS

The Indian Ceramics Triennale collaborated with the international peer-reviewed artists' platform <u>Artaxis</u>, to facilitate applications by Indian Ceramics Triennale artists. Artaxis is an evolving independent network of over 650 contemporary artists from over 40 countries.

He has been based in New Delhi since 1992, where, in 1997 he resurrected Nature Morte, aiming to champion young Indian artists and experimental art forms. Since then, Nature Morte has become one of India's most respected commercial galleries, representing many of the most important Indian artists who have come into prominence since the 1990s.

POOJA SOOD is a pioneer in the field of curating alternative contemporary art practices and exploring different models of collaboration and institution building in India and South Asia. She was the acting Director General of the Jawahar Kala Kendra. Pooja is a member of the Steering Group Committee on Arts Management for the Government of India. She was Artistic Director and curator of 48C. Public Art. Ecology, India's first public art project as well as the Apeejay Media Gallery, the first dedicated space for new media art in India. She is a Chevening scholar for the Clore Leadership Programme, UK.





RAY MEEKER is a graduate of the University of Southern California with a BFA in Ceramics. He is a member of the International Academy of Ceramics, Geneva. In 1971, with Deborah Smith, he founded the Golden Bridge Pottery in Pondicherry. The GBP courses, workshops, and residencies with international artists are unique in India. Many of the most respected Indian ceramic artists have attended his courses. He shows with Nature Morte in New Delhi and participates in group shows in various galleries in India and around the world.


